For this reason, the time-honoured practice awarding colours (half-blue) and Honours (full blue) is extended to fields other than sport at KDHS. In the armed services and in public life, distinguished service, devotion and bravery are suitably recognized. What the recipient has done is appreciated, and it is this recognition which may encourage others to aspire to service and higher endeavour.

Similarly, here, those who have worked consistently well, or played hard, conscientiously and successfully, or have rendered yeoman service to the School in divers spheres, are given due recognition. They are allowed to wear our attractively striped colours blazer. Outstanding achievement both academically and extra-curricularly (provincial selection, or occasionally exceptional qualities of leadership) earns the coveted Honours blazer.

Naturally, a lower standard of achievement is required for colours awards, so there must of necessity be more of these awards. This standard is above the average of one's teammates and the criteria are assiduous application, consistently good performances, and an ability to lose well and win modestly, and an indication that the potential recipient has made a concerted effort for his school.

It is understood that some fortunate pupils are generously blessed with innate intelligence or with superior athletic talent. Being so well endowed, they win these awards more easily. But there are many who overcome their lack of ability in any particular sphere by commendable determination, application, concentration and enthusiasm. These deserve to be rewarded. They give of themselves and their precious leisure to the School. They build a solid foundation esprit-de-corps. Their colours awards are well-merited.

Because at our co-educational school awards are considered for twelve different activities, it may appear that too many are made. This is unjustified.
